



## Reach 4 the Wind - Palma Crew Information

Thank you for booking with Reach 4 the Wind. Below is some information, which may be useful.

### Yacht and Base Information

Our Palma based training yacht is a Bavaria 38. She is named "Spirit of Beaulieu" and is berthed at The Marina **REAL CLUB NAUTICO DE PALMA**, Pier 13 - Berth 25.

The marina is approximately 10 minutes taxi ride (€20.00 or €2.00 per person via bus) from Palma airport. On arrival at the Marina you will come upon an entry control point where the taxi driver will need to tell the security the boat name "**Spirit of Beaulieu**"

The taxi will then be able to take you directly to pier 13 (embarcadero trece)

Spirit of Beaulieu is berthed at number 25, (fifty meters on the left side of the pier). If you make your way directly to the yacht I will be there to welcome you on-board. You are welcome to drop off bags any time on your arrivals day joining the yacht any time after 5 pm.

Mallorca's landscape is varied and beautiful it has the Tramuntana Mountain range which runs parallel to the North West coast. Away from the mountains you will find Orange, Clementine and Lemon trees, hillside terraces with there olive trees and wine producing grapes, and let's not forget the tiny villages, the abundance of pebble, rock and sandy beaches

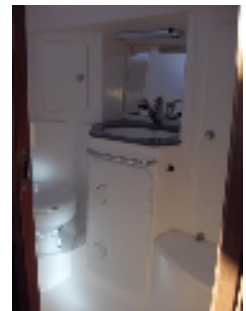
Sailing around the island, we will be able to visit perfect swimming bays and amazing lunch time stops.

Our itinerary will be weather dependant but could include visits to such stunning over night locations as Santa Ponsa, Puerto de Andraitx, Port de Soller, Port d Alcudia, Porto Cristo with magical lunch time stops such as Sant Elm and Sa Calobrs.

## **Money**

The currency in Mallorca is the EURO. Breakfast and lunches eaten on board are included in the holiday fee, however, all drinks, other meals and a share of the mooring fees will be at your own cost.

In the past, most people have generally budgeted for approx £40 to £60 per day, plus maybe a bit extra for presents etc but this will very much depend on your food/alcohol intake! (Credit Cards are widely accepted)

## **Bedding & Towels**

One set of sheets/pillows/blankets per person will be supplied. Remember to bring your own personal towels and beach towel.

## **Lotions & Potions**

If you are not used to the Mediterranean sun, it can be extremely strong, especially onboard a yacht where we will have sun, wind, salt water spray and you will definitely frazzle. Masses of high factor sun tan lotion or total sun block are recommended and don't forget your lip balm. A base ball cap, or two (one to lose - one to wear), is also a useful addition. We don't do sunstroke!

Mozzies are obviously not a problem when the boat is underway, but once we are stopped or you are ashore the little blighters will find your arms, ankles (and other places) so a good mosquito repellent is a must. If you are the unlucky sort who is badly affected then it's a good idea to bring your Antihistamine.

## **Odds & Sods**

Little things make life onboard easier. You'd be seriously hacked off if you lost your Gucci sunglasses over the side on day one, yes it does happen, so I recommend everybody remembers to bring one of those sunglasses straps which go around your head.

It is recommended that shoes are worn onboard when sailing. The decks get seriously hot and someone is bound to bash their foot against a winch or something, broken toes are common. Deck shoes or a pair of Reefers seem to be favoured. Reefers are not the most flattering item of clothing but they do the job and are invaluable – you'll find you live in them.

There will be loads of photo opportunities, so remember the camera.

There will be a first aid kit on the boat but, a small personal first aid kit is always a useful addition.

## **Music**

There's a CD player aboard the boat, so please bring along a selection, everything from Mozart to The Scissor Sisters. We also have the wherewithal to play "i-pod's"



## **Oilskins and Gloves**

Although it does rain sometimes and hopefully at night, it's not recommended that you lug over your heavy Musto's (boil in the bag comes to mind). If you have a lightweight, shower proof jacket and trousers, then that is ideal. If it does rain, generally you get wet and then just let the sun dry you. Sailing gloves are also a good idea

## **Diving**

There are a number of diving companies in the area so just in case you wish to spend anytime under the water and have the relevant qualifications then remember to bring your C-cards and computers.

For you folk who like to snorkel, bring along your masks and snorkels

## **Boys/Girl's clothes list**

During the summer you can never take too little, if you can get away with hand luggage so much the better. Rig for the day will hopefully be swimwear, shorts and t-shirts for the boys, swimwear sun tops and sarongs for the girls and in the evenings Boy's, the kit is really tee & polo shirts and shorts with the odd shirt. For the girls – its tee shirts, shorts and sun-tops with the odd light weight dress.

Outside the summer months, July - September it could go a little cool in the evening so some warm tops / fleeces are also recommended

Other useful items: – Personal medical kit, e.g. Nurophen and Immodium, no-rinse hair conditioner (precious water saving), we have a hairdryer on board so there is no need to bring one along and lets not forget a good book or two.
